After 150 years, we are rooted: by the strength of our partnerships, our innovative approach and by the collective action we inspire.

Stepping into American Forests during its 150th year has been one of the great honors of my career. After nearly three decades working to protect and restore the lands that sustain us, I can tell you: no organization is better positioned to meet the moment than this one.

When trees and forests can't recover on their own, American Forests steps in. Our 2025 results are a testament to that. With your support, we grew forests that will last, planting and regenerating more than 4.1 million climate-resilient trees from Texas' Rio Grande Valley to Washington State. We built wildfire resilience in places like California and Northern Colorado where the stakes could not be higher. We invested in trees for healthy communities, working directly with more than 460 cities nationwide to bring the cooling, lifesaving benefits of trees to neighborhoods that need them most. We built and led coalitions to advance federal policy efforts, including the bipartisan Fix Our Forests Act and Cool Corridors Act, and defended critical investments like the Inflation Reduction Act's historic Urban and Community Forestry funding.

That progress is the product of partnership, groundbreaking science and data put to practical use, and the mobilization of communities ready to lead, with American Forests acting as a catalyst.

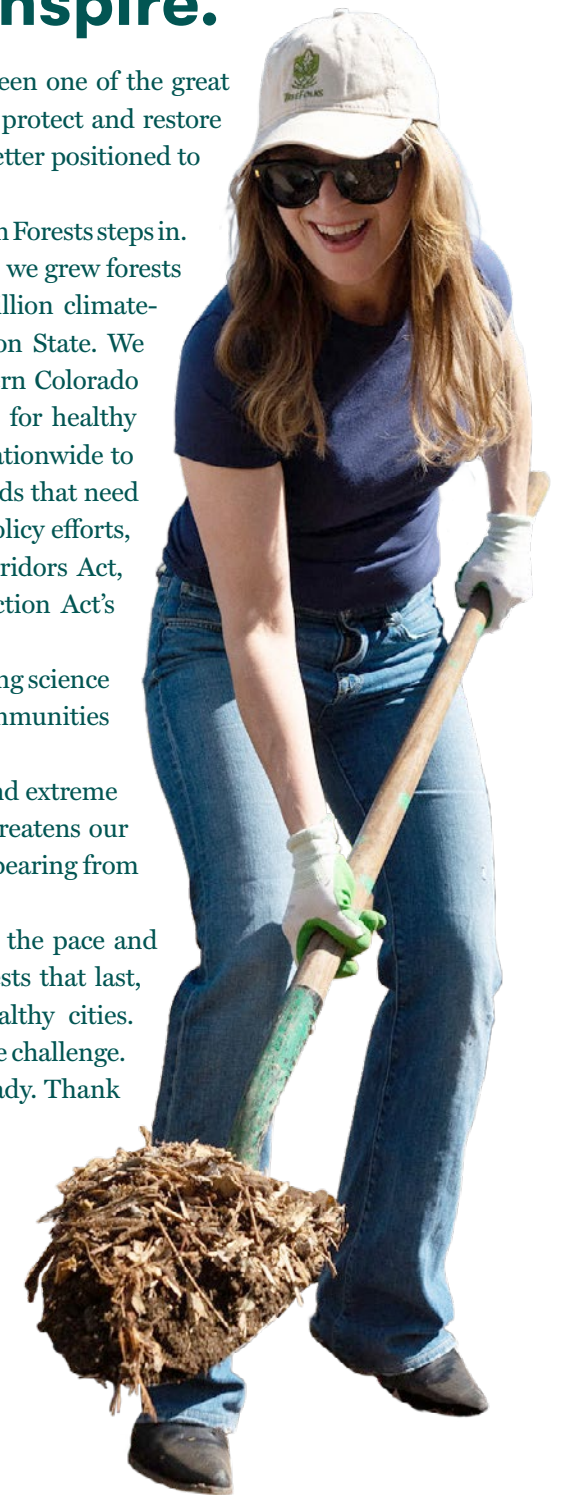

EMPOWERING LOCAL ACTION ROOTED IN COMMUNITY

Through our Catalyst Fund, American Forests is supporting local non-profit Louisiana Green Corps in their efforts to expand tree canopy throughout New Orleans while providing economic opportunity for community residents and advancing Tree Equity in “The Big Easy.”

A tree’s vitality is defined by its roots: a system in which countless hairs intertwine and spread wide to increase nutrient and water absorption for growth. In the same manner, American Forests’ impact grows stronger and more resilient through our expansive ecosystem of partners and supporters. Rooted in partnership, we cultivate collaborations that amplify our impact for forests and the communities that depend on them.

In 2025, we empowered 56 local organizations through our Catalyst Fund to advance Tree Equity — rooted in community and powered by local action to achieve nationwide impact. Across large landscapes, we deepened collaboration on public, Tribal and private lands and leveraged cross-sector partnerships to drive landscape-scale reforestation.

Rooted in communities across the country, American Forests has partnered with local leaders to drive national progress toward Tree Equity to ensure that every neighborhood has access to the lifesaving benefits of trees. In 2025, through the Catalyst Fund, we partnered with 19 new community- and faith-based organizations by equipping them with the funding, technical expertise and connections needed to grow Tree Equity from the ground up.

From small cities to major metropolitan areas, these partnerships, along with our original 37 municipal grantees, demonstrate that lasting progress begins with community and is driven by local action. In Goshen, Indiana, municipal leaders are reimagining their future through expanded tree canopy and workforce development. In New Orleans, community-based organizations are creating pathways to green careers while restoring vital urban forest infrastructure. In Atlanta, faith leaders are connecting stewardship to daily life, cultivating both trees and a sense of shared responsibility. And in Phoenix, neighborhood organizers are advancing tree planting as a frontline defense against extreme heat, linking public health and environmental action.

Together, these efforts delivered measurable impact in 2025: 17,876 trees planted and cared for in areas where they are needed most, 56,261 community members engaged, and 326 participants trained through workforce programs leading to 180 jobs, apprenticeships or placements. Each effort is distinct, shaped by local need, yet all are rooted in one common approach: empowering communities to lead.

American Forests acts as a catalyst so those closest to the challenges can drive the solutions needed to create healthier, stronger communities with more cooling shade, improved air and water quality, and reduced flood risk where it's need most.



During 2025, American Forests supported 19 community- and faith-based organizations, including Georgia Interfaith Power & Light, to connect environmental justice, shared stewardship and community engagement with efforts to advance Tree Equity.

Leaving a lasting legacy with Life Time Foundation

As part of a five-year agreement with the National Park Service, American Forests is collaborating with an entire ecosystem of partners and supporters, including Life Time Foundation, to conduct whitebark pine conservation and restoration efforts across iconic national parks. American Forests also partnered with Life Time Foundation to develop a storytelling campaign to shine light on the collaborative efforts taking place as well as the dedicated, passionate individuals carrying out this work in the field.





ENSURING CLEAN DRINKING WATER FOR THE NEXT GENERATION

In California, American Forests partnered with The Coca-Cola Foundation and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to help restore critical watersheds in Eldorado National Forest burned by the 2021 Caldor Fire. Together, we are restoring watershed function within critically important tributaries to the San Joaquin and Sacramento River basins that supply clean water to two-thirds of Californians and millions of acres of agricultural producers.

FORGING A MISSION-LEVEL PARTNERSHIP WITH TOM’S OF MAINE

American Forests and Tom’s of Maine have grown a partnership rooted in shared purpose and mission-level impact. Tom’s of Maine’s flexible, multi-year support allows American Forests to direct resources *where they’re needed most, when they’re needed most*, advancing wildfire resilience, climate-smart reforestation, and work spanning landscapes and seasons. Built on authentic alignment and transparency, this approach unlocks stronger collaboration and yields deeper, more responsive conservation impact. With trust at its core, the partnership delivers credible, scalable outcomes that meet the current moment while shaping what comes next.

DEEPENING INSIGHTS STATEWIDE WITH THE WASHINGTON STATE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

In July, American Forests and the Washington State Department of Natural Resources deepened its statewide coalition of 48 local governments with the launch of the Washington State Tree Equity Score Analyzer. This innovative tool advances data-driven, equitable urban forestry statewide by combining local analytics with robust mapping capabilities to empower leaders at the neighborhood, city and state level to identify gaps in tree canopy and prioritize tree planting where it’s needed most, ensuring healthier, more resilient communities.

Rooted by our innovative approach

IMPLEMENTING INNOVATIVE TECHNIQUES FOR WHITEBARK PINE RESTORATION

American Forests is implementing emerging restoration methods like direct seeding to increase time and cost efficiency in efforts to restore whitebark pine, a species critical to overall ecosystem health, across national parks within its range.

Largely unseen yet essential to a tree's foundational stability, roots funnel nourishment for the visible branches and canopy to grow and thrive. Much the same, science and data are the bedrock of American Forests' innovative approach to fostering climate-smart forests, building wildfire resilience and investing in trees for healthier cities.

In 2025, we published groundbreaking research and reports to guide future restoration strategies; launched new tools, toolkits and resources; and advanced permanent reforestation pipeline solutions. We expanded the Tree Equity Score tool's capabilities with new shade mapping features, equipping city leaders and partners with the data needed to provide shade where it is needed most to create healthier, safer communities.



We published groundbreaking research and analysis to accelerate climate-resilient forestry across landscapes.

In June, American Forests and the UCLA Luskin Center for Innovation released a new Tree Equity Score shade mapping feature for more than 330 U.S. cities to identify where shade is needed most to best combat the health impacts of extreme heat.

AMERICAN FORESTS is advancing a new era of innovation, rooted in science and driven by urgency. In 2025, we strengthened our role as a thought leader in forestry by producing groundbreaking analyses and reports that will shape how landscapes are managed, restored and sustained for generations.

In Northern Colorado, where more than 540,000 acres have burned since 2000, American Forests led the development of a science-driven reforestation strategy in partnership with the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests, water providers, conservation districts, research institutions and community partners. The plan identifies more than 190,000 acres at risk of delayed regeneration or permanent forest loss and maps a path forward, prioritizing restoration to protect watersheds, biodiversity and communities most.

American Forests also published a report providing critical new insight into how forest management and wood utilization can contribute to natural climate solutions in California. Completing statewide carbon modeling, the report outlines climate-smart forestry practices that could reduce projected carbon emissions from California's forests by up to 14% and spare the loss of nearly 40% of California's forests by 2070. The study has inspired the most ambitious forest resilience plan nationally.

At the same time, we are tackling two of reforestation's most fundamental challenges: seed supply and forestry workforce gaps. In collaboration with the U.S. Forest Service, Oregon Department of Forestry and other partners, we published a guide to support the planning, funding and implementation of large-scale cone collection efforts.

Through a first-of-its-kind analysis, we also forecasted reforestation needs across the Pacific Northwest, over the next 50 years, helping to align investment, workforce and capacity with the true scale of need.

Together, these efforts ensure that science and data drive decisions that will grow stronger, more resilient forests for the future.



In 2025, American Forests and cross-sector collaborators published the Northern Colorado Reforestation Strategy, an innovative framework prioritizing restoration efforts based on ecological resilience and protection of critical water infrastructure. The strategy focuses on strengthening the regional reforestation pipeline to chart an actionable path to restore resilient forests.

Developing new tools, toolkits and resources to advance Tree Equity

American Forests is continually innovating new resources to equip communities to advance Tree Equity. Last year, we relaunched Vibrant Cities Lab with new tools, including a Cool Corridors Guide, Urban Forestry Roadmap and Forest Health insights to help urban foresters address climate stressors. We also released Tree Equity Handbook Toolkits, offering practical guidance and interactive resources that complement those in Vibrant Cities Lab. Together, these tools translate science into action by empowering local leaders, urban foresters and advocates to build healthier, more resilient communities.

American Forests and Liberty Mutual are advancing Tree Equity across Greater Boston by building the capacity needed to manage the full lifecycle of the urban forest, from data tools to climate-resilient tree supply and long-term maintenance to workforce development, through a \$300,000 planning grant establishing a new green jobs map. Together, we are creating stronger systems, greener neighborhoods and more equitable access to the many benefits trees provide.

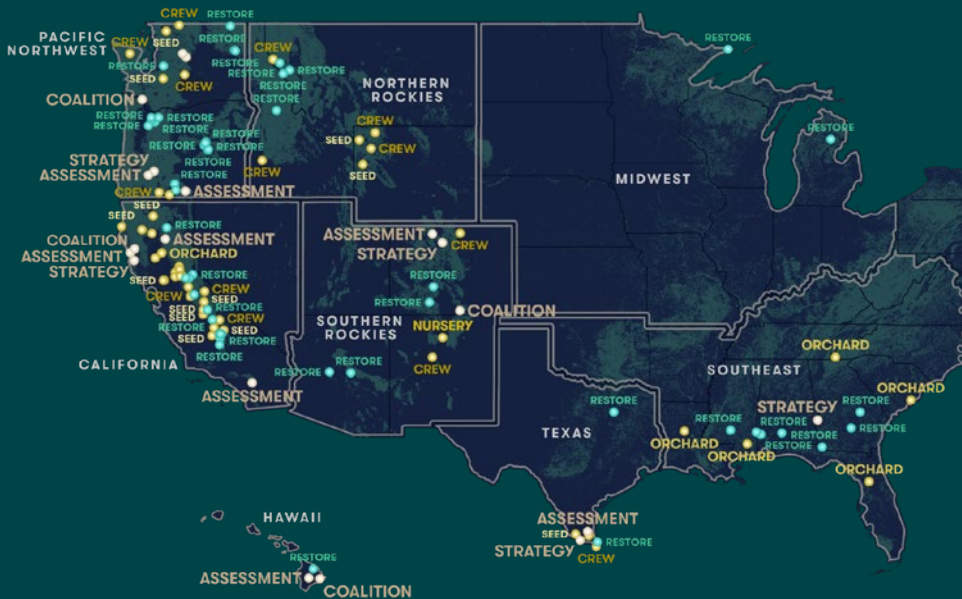
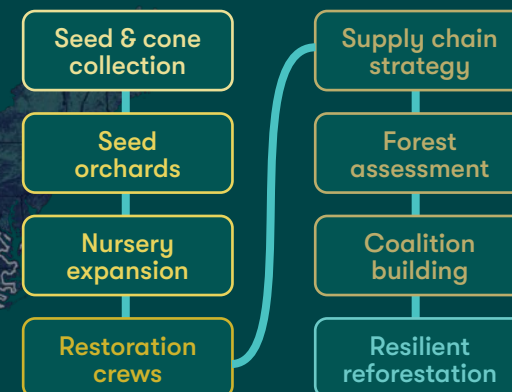

CREATING PERMANENT SOLUTIONS TO SCALE UP THE REFORESTATION SUPPLY CHAIN

As the impacts of climate change continue to intensify, coordinated action, sustained investment and the growth of innovative industries is needed. To address this challenge, American Forests is expanding the reforestation pipeline nationwide by strengthening the full system needed to move from seed sourcing to seedling production to replanting. The goal is to ensure billions of climate-adapted seedlings are sourced, grown and ready for planting when and where forests have burned and failed to regenerate.

Rooted by building from the ground up

ENGAGING AN ENTIRE COMMUNITY IN RESTORATION

Through support from Pentair — a leader in helping the world sustainably move, improve and enjoy water, life's most essential resource — and a wide network of cross-sector partners, the 2025 Rio Reforestation volunteer planting event in Texas' Rio Grande Valley drew 1,800 community members to help restore native thornforest habitat back to the region by planting nearly 11,000 seedlings. The annual event continues to remain American Forests' largest volunteer, community-led planting with 2025's gathering registering the highest attendance ever.

Like a root system — the network through which trees communicate, share resources and strengthen one another — movements grow stronger when connections run deep. At American Forests, we are rooted in collective action, cultivating a network that amplifies local grassroots efforts into lasting nation-wide impact.

In 2025, we mobilized community members through a large-scale planting in the Rio Grande Valley. We convened forestry leaders to promote shared learning and problem solving at the 9th American Forest Congress. We advanced thought leadership across conferences, trained current and future professionals, expanded access with Tree Equity Score — Spanish, and elevated our story through media outreach and our 150th anniversary events.



We convened leaders and advanced policy efforts to move the needle on a transformational, national effort to steward and conserve our nation's forests.

In 2025, American Forests trained, inspired, motivated and empowered urban foresters, community advocates, city leaders, allied professionals and the next generation of foresters through

AMERICAN FORESTS continued to shape the future of forestry in 2025 through our policy and planning efforts by convening leaders, supporting legislation and protecting critical federal investments. At the center of this work was the 9th American Forest Congress, a landmark gathering of more than 500 leaders from across the nation — including environmental, scientific, economic, landowner, industry and community leaders; policy and changemakers; and state, local and Tribal governments — united around one shared goal: growing healthy forests and supporting thriving communities.

As the steward of this historic convening, American Forests created space for shared learning, inspiration and problem solving at a national scale. Together, participants explored urgent challenges facing forests and communities and developed, debated and voted on resolutions designed to guide the future of forest stewardship across landscapes and generations. The Congress reflected the power of collective action and was made possible through the support of the Doris Duke Foundation, JM Kaplan Fund, Wilburforce Foundation, 444S Foundation, Lazar Foundation, Jubitz Family Foundation, the U.S. Forest Service and others.

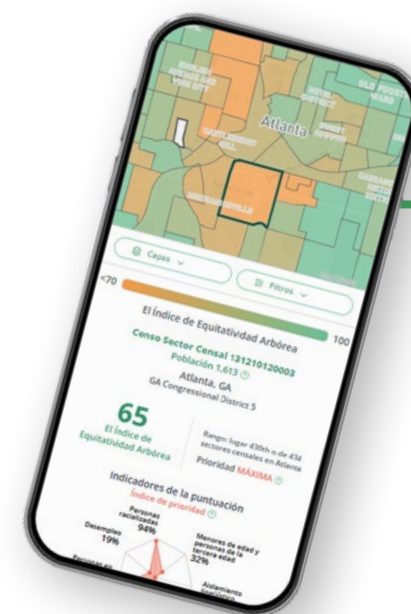
That same spirit of collective action carried into our policy work. American Forests helped introduce and support legislation advancing forest resilience, urban forestry and climate adaptation, including the Fix Our Forests Act, bipartisan Cool Corridors Act, TREES Act, the SHADE Act, Forest Conservation Easement Program Act, Save Our Sequoias Act, White Oak Resilience Act, Disaster Reforestation Act, Wildfire Emergency Act, Community Wood Facilities Assistance Act, and the Tribal Self-Determination and Co-Management in Forestry Act, among others. We also submitted public comments on critical federal actions, including the USDA reorganization, the proposed rescission of the Roadless Rule and the EPA greenhouse gas endangerment finding.

At a time of federal funding uncertainty, American Forests also worked to protect vital investments by engaging Congress and coalition partners to defend Forest Service, National Park Service, and Fish and Wildlife Service grants, including the Inflation Reduction Act's historic Urban and Community Forestry funding. From partnerships to policy, we helped move the needle on a transformational national effort to steward and conserve our forests.



Fostering collaboration and driving progress

Throughout 2025, American Forests' leadership in forestry fostered collaboration and drove progress toward a more resilient future. We were recognized at the U.S. Conference for Mayors for best practices in leveraging trees for climate resilience, public health and economic development. We participated in urban forestry and policy panels at the Partners in Community Forestry Conference. We hosted The Understory, convening 150 leaders across sectors to focus on building the systems, capacity and relationships needed to restore forests at scale. And, in partnership with Salesforce and the World Economic Forum, our 1t.org US (now Forest Plus) team hosted the Forest Partners Leadership Convening, where the late great Jane Goodall spoke on the urgent need to conserve and restore forests.



In November, five years since its launch, Tree Equity Score unveiled a Spanish-language version to expand access to our flagship national mapping tool, reaching an additional 42 million Spanish-speaking Americans, making it easier for more communities to grow greener, safer and more resilient cities.



CELEBRATING 150 YEARS

Last year, American Forests marked our 150th Anniversary by celebrating both a legacy rooted in impact and a bold vision for the future. We held an event in New York City — sponsored by Salesforce and co-hosted by Board Member Paul Boynton, Bruce Lisman and Kyla Sternlieb, and Roger Sant and Doris Matsui — and one in Seattle, sponsored by Weyerhaeuser and co-hosted by past Board Chair Ara Erickson and Paul Boynton. Through these in-person events and a digital campaign, we told the story of where we've been, what we've accomplished, and most importantly, where we are headed.

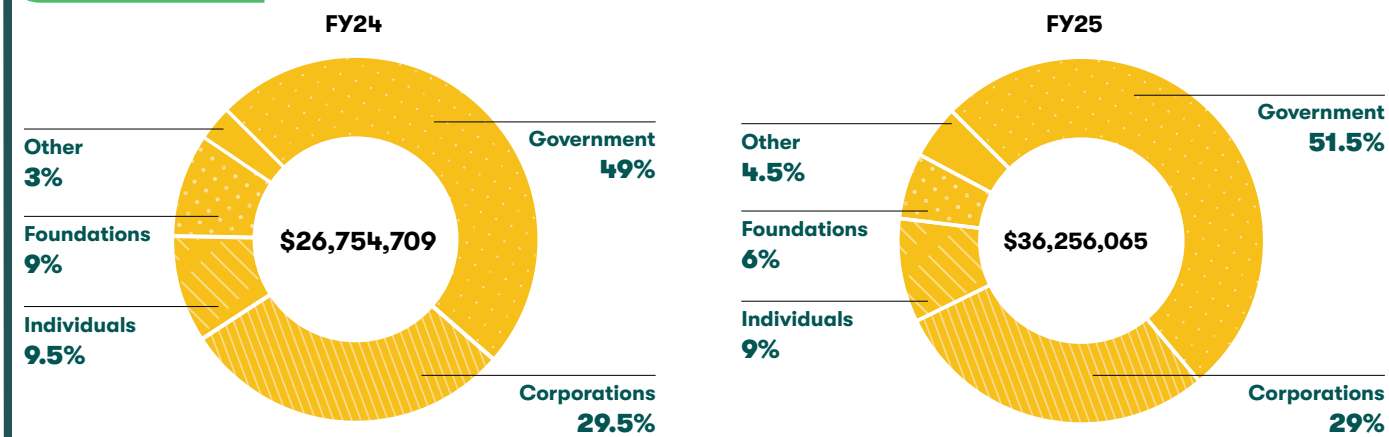

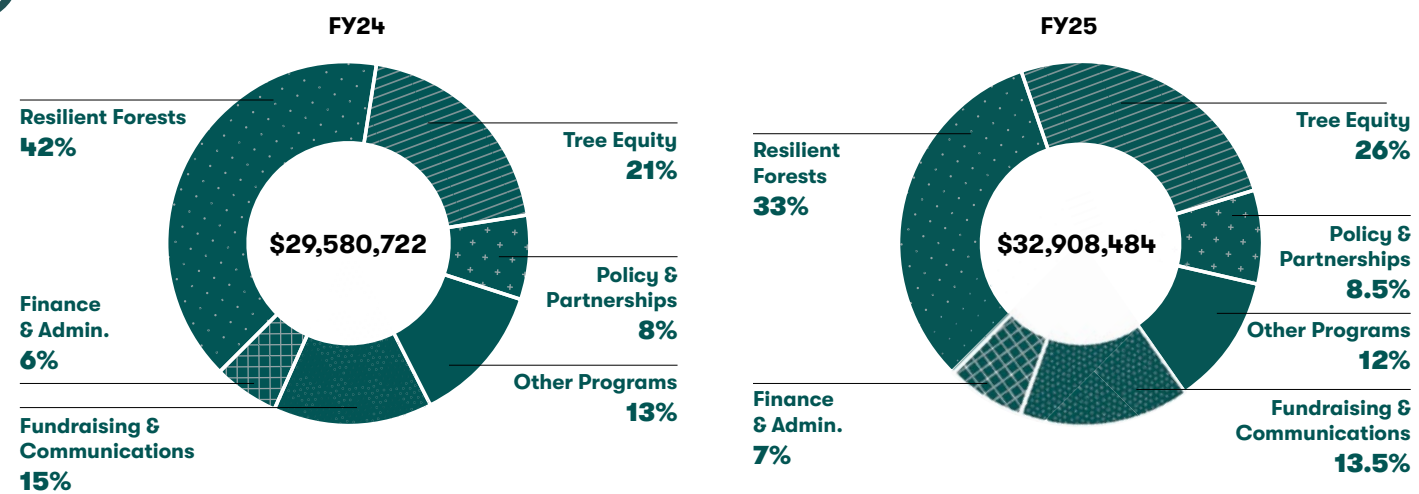
